Food for Thought! The Assembly, a Community of Faith:

Experiencing God in Communal Worship “We believe that Christ is present and active in the liturgy in diverse ways: in the gathered assembly, in the word proclaimed, in the presiding minister, in the eucharistic species (CSL, 7). Christ, as high priest, is the source of communication that takes place in the liturgy as the mediator from God to the community of faith, and from the community of faith to God... Through Christ in the power of the Spirit, we carry out our ministry in the assembly. Active participation in sacramental action enables us to become more Christ-like, more human. At the same time it is operative in making the church a visible sign or sacrament of Christ’s dynamic presence in the world... The community of faith is called to respond to God’s call, to live as the people of God, the body of Christ.
